Information on Group Visits to the Heritage Centre

What Are We? We are a group of enthusiasts initially set up 40 years ago to preserve some of the theatre organs then operating daily in the North West. 15 years ago the Trust decided to purchase its own venue and to create a cinema atmosphere of the early 1930's era where we could install and play one of our heritage instruments and develop a museum collection of associated artefacts.

We are a Charitable, Volunteer owned and operated organisation which does not receive any public funding. Our organisation relies on subscriptions from Members, revenue from four concerts each year at Stockport Town Hall, and the fullest utilisation of the Heritage Centre for weekly concerts and visits from organisations like yours.

Where Are We? We are located in Alexander Road, Peel Green, Eccles, just off the A57 between the M60 junction 11 and Eccles centre. Apart from good road connections we are also accessible by train from Patricroft or Eccles stations, or from Eccles Metrolink terminus and a short bus ride or walk. There is free parking for about 20 cars or a large coach immediately in front of our centre.

What Do We Offer? Our Auditorium: The usual visit takes the form of a nostalgic trip back to the cinema of the late 1920s or early 30's. The show begins as the house light dim and the Wurlitzer organ rises out of the floor. We can then show one or more short introductory films, followed by an interval when tea or coffee and biscuits are available. The second half can include an old black and white film such as Laurel & Hardy, and can last anything from 2 minutes to half an hour. The visit would then conclude with more organ music, often ending in the traditional way with a sing-along.

We can, of course, tailor your visit to your own requirements and time scales. We are able to provide technical talks on how the organs work and the work carried out by Cheshire born telephone engineer Robert Hope-Jones who's inventions made the Wurlitzer organ possible.

Some groups may also wish for members to have a go playing the Wurlitzer themselves and an 'open console' session can be included in the proceedings if required.

Our Museum: Our unique Museum illustrating the history of the Theatre Organ, and the work of its inventor, Cheshire born Robert Hope-Jones (1859-1914), is in our basement area. Here we have some of the world's first Tibia pipes (the main underlying sound of a Theatre Organ) and electric actions with some of the parts made by Henry Royce, of Rolls Royce fame.

In the Museum, visitors can also see the pipes inside the chamber of the Wurlitzer organ that they have been listening to. As well as the pipes there are real musical instruments which are played from the console upstairs. The Museum is also accessible by a stair lift.

Our Shop: In the main auditorium is the Trust's sales stall selling a wide variety of CDs and various souvenirs of your visit. Our Centre Manager's Book "From Wirral to Wurlitzer" tells the story of how the Wurlitzer Theatre Organ was "born" in Wirral, Cheshire.

Downstairs in the Museum is the Vintage Sales Stall. Here you will find many items of unusual and historic interest such as good old vinyl LP records, cassettes, booklets, magazines and a good selection of sheet music, all at give-away prices.

Our Other Facilities: In addition to the entertainment and museum we are able to offer light refreshments. We have full modern toilets and all parts of the building are fully accessible.

When Are We Open? We give concerts open to the general public every Wednesday at 1pm. For group visits by prior appointment we can open any day except Wednesdays and Sundays. Visits are best planned for late morning, early afternoon or evening in order to avoid rush hour traffic!

What Is Our Capacity and Our Costs? The Centre can seat up to 80 people, and we are licensed for up to 100. The ideal group size is between 20 and 80. If your group is smaller, then we may like to combine two groups together in order to enhance the "atmosphere!"

- The cost for a single ticket to our Wednesday concert is £3.50
- A private group visit costs £85 which includes an organist.
- Tea or coffee and biscuits are charged at £1 per person.
- As a Charity we are able to receive 25% Gift Aid on all personal donations and we have provided an Organ Pipe for your convenience by the Sales Stall and in the Museum.
